

There is an open house on November 7th at 6:00p.m at W.T. Eich Middle School to discuss and share information on the Oak Ridge Drive Bridge Replacement Project. The project includes replacing the existing bridge and expanding the existing sidewalk. The Open House will include stations where participants can view exhibits, maps, and a project schedule. A brief presentation about the project will start at 6:15 pm. Representatives from the City and the project team will be available to answer questions and discuss ideas in an informal format.

Hopefully all those interested in the Greenway Multi-Use Trail made it to the 10th and final Dry Creek Greenway Multi-Use Trail Project Stakeholder Representative Group (SRG) meeting. The next phase will begin and that is the Environmental Impact portion. The following is a Statement for Mike Dour of the City of Roseville.

In compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), the City of Roseville will prepare a Notice of Preparation (NOP) to notify the public and other interested parties that a Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) will be prepared for the Dry Creek Greenway Multi-Use Trail Project, and to solicit feedback on the scope and content of the analysis in the DEIR. Potential environmental effects identified in the NOP will be further analyzed in the DEIR. The NOP will be circulated for a 30-day comment period, during which a public scoping meeting will be conducted. The public scoping meeting will be held on December 3, 2013 from 6:00 to 8:00 pm at the Maidu Community Center and will include project information, copies of the NOP, and forms for providing written comments. The City will prepare and distribute a notice that will identify the NOP public comment period and comment due date, where copies of the NOP can be obtained, and how to submit written comments on the NOP. Neighborhood ¢ommon \$ense Plan for Long-term Care Costs

November is Long-term Care Awareness Month. And when it comes to long-term care — such as a stay in a nursing home or the services provided by a home health aide — you'll want to plan for the potential costs involved.

Of course, you might think that you'll always be able to live independently, without requiring any assistance — and perhaps you will. However, the odds aren't necessarily in your favor: About 70% of Americans who reach the age of 65 will need some form of long-term care in their lives for an average of three years, according to estimates from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

And every type of long-term care is expensive. Consider these numbers, taken from the 2013 Cost of Care Survey produced by Genworth, a financial security company:

- The national average rate for a private room in a nursing home is \$83,950 a jump of 24% over the past five years. And it's not much cheaper for a semi-private room in a nursing home the average cost is \$75,405 per year, up 23% from five years ago.
- A full-time home health aide costs, on average, \$44,479 per year.

If you had to spend more than \$80,000 per year for a nursing home, and you needed to stay in that nursing home for several years, what would it do to your savings? How would it affect all your financial goals?

Many people think Medicare will pay for long-term care expenses, but that's just not the case. In reality, Medicare only covers a small percentage of long-term care costs, which means it's typically up to the individual to foot the bills.

Essentially, you have a couple of options. Forbes: Buy Now or Pay More Later?

Even though no one at KCM actively lists or sells real estate, some of our readers believe that there is an inherent basis toward the real estate community in our writing. For that reason, we want to quote a third party source today. Forbes, in their online edition last week, spoke to the importance of buying a home now rather than waiting.

The article, Should You Buy a Home Now or Pay More Later?, explains:

"With mortgage rates creeping up toward 5% as 2013 draws to a close, potential home buyers have some decisions to make — and soon.

The danger for potential homebuyers isn't that mortgage rates are nearing 5,00%; the real threat is that rates could go higher, to 5.50% or even 6.00% in 2014."

DRY CREEK GREENWAY MULTI-USE TRAIL PROJECT

The City of Roseville is beginning the next phase of planning for the Dry Creek Greenway Trail Project. It is a proposed Class I multi-use trail along Dry, Cirby and Linda Creeks that would begin near Darling Way/ Riverside Ave and continue east to the City limits past the Old Auburn Road/South Cirby Way intersection, a distance of about 4.25 miles. The current phase of work will include additional feasibility analysis for select segments of trail, preliminary engineering, and environmental review.



The Dry Creek Greenway Multi-use Trail is envisioned as a paved, off-street trail along Dry, Cirby and Linda Creeks that will provide residents a place for bicycling, walking, running and dog-walking for fun, education, recreation and transportation.

The Dry Creek Greenway Multi-use Trail is a vital component of the City of Roseville bikeway and trail system because it will provide a safe, comfortable, convenient and highly connected bike route as an alternative to using City streets in an area of the City that is under served by bicycle facilities. The Dry Creek Greenway trail will connect schools and businesses to residential neighborhoods. The trail will also provide important regional connections as it is part of a series of existing and planned trails that will form a loop around the greater South Placer/ Sacramento area.

The Dry Creek Greenway Multi-use Trail is planned for the south side of the City, beginning at the west City limits near the City Corporation Yard and extending to the east city limits near Old Auburn Road. The current planning effort will study the trail from Riverside Avenue to the City limits just past Old Auburn Road (see map below). Challenges for the project include neighborhood compatibility, limited availability of right-of-way, roadway crossings, existing utilities and environmental factors.

The City of Roseville released the Updated Feasibility Analysis for the Dry Creek Greenway Multi-Use Trail Project. The anal-

ysis incorporates the results of preliminary engineering studies for the project, as well as the valuable public feedback received over the past 12 months, including Open House #3, which was held on March 21, 2013 and attended by over sixty community members. NOVEMBER GARDEN CHECKLIST

- 1. Don't forget to plant tulips and hyacinths you have chilling in your refrigerator.
- 2. It's time for clean-up. Pull summer annuals and vegetables and prune dead or broken branches.
- 3. Spray peaches and apricots at leaf fall with a product containing at least 50% copper.




- 4. Rake and compost leaves and plant materials. Dispose of diseased materials.
- 5. For larger blooms, remove excess camellia buds
- 6. Feed the cool season flowers and veggies you planted last month.
- 7. Water plants that rains cannot reach.
- 8. Remove the bands of corrugated cardboard used to trap codling moths larvae from around apple tree trunks and dispose of them.

WHAT TO PLANT IN NOVEMBER

FLOWERS: Seed wildflowers. Plant spring flowering bulbs, corms, and tubers, and spring-blooming flowers such as sweet pea, clarkia, larkspur, and California poppies. Last chance for setting out cool-weather annuals.



FRUITS AND VEGETABLES: Direct seed bok choy, lettuce, mustard, peas, radishes, and spinach. Indoors, start broccoli, kale and collards. Plant bare-root artichokes now through March. TREES AND SHRUBS: This is the best time to plant.
