Spring Minestrone with Chicken Meatballs

Submitted by Erin Tarekegn from Epicurious.com **Ingredients:** (Chop whatever veggies you have and add to make this soup.)

- 6 ounces ground chicken (about 3/4 cup) (you can also add chicken sausage for a little • 2 tablespoons extra-virgin
- 1/2 cup fresh breadcrumbs
- 6 tablespoons finely grated Parmesan, divided, plus more for garnish
- 4 garlic cloves, 2 minced, 2 thinly sliced
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh
- 1 large egg, whisked to blend

- Kosher salt, freshly ground
- olive oil
- 1 leek, white and pale-green parts only, sliced into 1/4" rounds
- 5 cups low-salt chicken broth
- 3/4 cup small pasta
- 1 cup 1/2" rounds peeled carrots
- 1 cup (packed) baby spinach
- Chopped fresh basil

Preparation: Mix chicken, breadcrumbs, 3 tablespoons Parmesan, 2 minced garlic cloves, chives, egg, 3/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper in a medium bowl. Form into 1/2"-diameter meatballs (makes about 28).

Heat oil in a small pot over medium heat. Cook meatballs until golden all over, about 3 minutes (they will finish cooking in soup). Transfer to a plate; set aside.

Add leek to pot and cook, stirring often, until beginning to soften, about 3 minutes. Add 2 thinly sliced garlic cloves; cook for 1 minute. Add broth and 2 cups water; bring to a boil. Stir in pasta and carrots; simmer until pasta is almost al dente, about 8 minutes. Add meatballs; simmer until pasta is al dente, carrots are tender, and meatballs are cooked through, about 3 minutes. Add spinach and remaining 3 tablespoons Parmesan; stir until spinach is wilted and Parmesan is melted. Season with salt and pepper.

Ladle soup into bowls. Garnish with chopped basil and Parmesan.

May Garden Checklist

As seen in the Sacramento Bee, January 1, 2014 edition of "Path To Success" by Pat Rubin Placer County Master Gardener



- 1. Pinch back fuchsias, mums and petunias to keep them full and bushy. Remove spent flowers from annuals like marigolds.
- Prune away spent iris stalks. Fertilize iris with a 10-10-10 fertilizer.
- Pinch spent blossoms from marigolds and petunias to keep them producing. If any marigolds develop seeds, let them dry on the plant and sprinkle them where you want them to come up next year.
- 4. Break off old flowers on rhododendrons. Be careful not to damage the new buds or you won't have any flowers next year.
- 5. Pinch asters marguerites, petunias, mums and fuchsias for busier growth.
- 6. Feed your lawn. For most lawns, nitrogen is the only nutrient needed on a regular basis.
- Watch newly planted trees, shrubs, vegetables and perennials for signs of stress, mainly from heat or lack of water while they are getting established. A slow soak that wets the entire root area is best. Apply mulch to the soil to conserve water.
- 8. Prune spring blooming shrubs like forsythia after they are done blooming.
- 9. Watch for aphids on roses hose them off or use insecticidal soap.
- 10. Begin summer pruning of fruit trees to keep them small. Keep thinning fruit on fruit trees, especially near the ends of the branches.
- 11. Mark the raspberry and blackberry stems that are producing fruit. You'll cut these vines to the ground at the end of the
- 12. Cut gladioli stalks back when flowers have died.



WHAT TO PLANT IN May

Fruits: Plant pumpkins and melons. You can seed them directly where you want them to grow.

Vegetables to plant now: cucumbers, radishes, tomatoes, squash, eggplant and melons. For a succession of crops, plant beans, radishes, carrots and corn every two weeks through July

Flowers: to plant from seed this month: sunflowers, zinnia, marigolds, cosmos, salvia, celosia and asters. You can sow them where you want them to grow (pay attention to sun and water) or in pots.

Green Home: Four Tips To Conserving Water in The Kitchen

As clean drinking water is becoming ever more scarce on earth, we all will have to become more conscious of conserving this vital resource. Besides our yards, our kitchens account for the bulk of water usage. We can significantly cut down our water usage by changing our everyday habits and update our kitchen with water saving items.

#1 Keep a pitcher of drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool for a glass of water.

#2 Install and properly maintain an aerator on the faucet. These small mesh screens screw on to the mouth of the faucet and when damaged, no longer efficiently restrict water flow. If the faucet is old and doesn't feature a screw on aerator, installing a new faucet is highly advised.

#3 Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator overnight instead of using running water to defrost frozen foods.

#4 Upgrade to an Energy Star rated dishwasher. These appliances are rated to use one-third less water than standard models and demand less electricity to run. Government statistics say Energy Star dishwashers use only four gallons per cycle. Compared to standard dishwasher that uses six gallons each load, The current range of dishwashers and detergents are efficiently designed and don't require a rinse in the sink. And if you do want to rinse the dishes, the dishwasher's rinse cycle is the way to go, using only a fraction of the water used when hand rinsing.

Y.A.N.A. (You are Not Alone)

The Roseville Police Department is offering a new telephone reassurance program for disabled or housebound seniors who live in Roseville. Police volunteers will call those enrolled in this free, voluntary program at a pre-arranged day



and time each week to check on their well being. The volunteers have a variety of local resources at their fingertips to offer enrollees, to help them become more empowered and connected to the community. If the senior doesn't answer the phone after a few attempts, a series of follow-up steps will be taken to ensure their safety and well-being, including a possible home visit. Senior residents can enroll themselves in the program, or they can be referred by a concerned relative or friend. The Roseville Police Department has launched an online property room, with the goal of getting recovered property items back to their rightful owners. Ideally, everyone should keep good records of valuable belongings including serial numbers, so that if they're stolen, they can be entered into state and national

stolen property databases. Law enforcement can quickly identify such items as stolen property, and get them back to their rightful owners. In reality, many victims don't know the serial numbers of their stolen items, or their stolen goods include jewelry and other items with no serial numbers. When officers recover such items, they don't have any way of tracing those items back to their owners, so the unclaimed items are stored in the police department's property room. If they're not claimed, eventually property room staff has to auction them off in order to make room for new items. In an effort to get more of these unclaimed found items back to their owners, the RPD's property clerks have started an online property room here: www.roseville.ca.us/recoveredproperty. The website includes small pictures and brief descriptions of unclaimed property. If you've lost something or been the victim of a theft, and never got your property back, please browse through the pictures in the online property room. If you think an item might be yours, click on "claim this item" and fill out the form, including as much descriptive information about your stolen item as possible, and RPD staff will contact you

Put Your Paws Together for Our Animal Control Officers!

They don't make international news by catching crocodiles in shopping centers every day, but Roseville's animal control officers--John Bennett, Laura Morin and Sara DeRego--work hard

every day to protect public safety and the welfare of animals.

Roseville's animal control officers respond to a wide variety of problems, including barking dog complaints, "baking" dog complaints (dogs left unattended in hot vehicles), animal bites, dog park disputes and the humble but essential job of picking up dead animals from our roadways. Loose crocodile complaints are fairly unusual (okay, there's been one), but our ACOs more often respond to problems involving wild turkeys, feral cats, stuck ducklings, injured owls and ferocious barricaded opossums. They would rather not cite pet owners, so they spend many hours offering counseling and guidance about how to solve pet behavior issues. Their job requires not only animal handling skills, but excellent people skills too, as they deal with many highly emotional situations involving people and their pets.

Please join us in thanking these hard-working, dedicated professionals. They play a vital role in protecting Roseville's high quality of life.

Local Catalytic converter thieves are back with a vengeance.

We've taken numerous reports this week, most in east Roseville. Almost all the recently targeted vehicles were Toyota Sequoia SUVs. If you own a Toyota SUV or truck, or other high-profile vehicle, try to park it in the garage overnight. Also, please call one of our partnering auto shops and schedule an appointment to have your converter painted and etched with your vehicle's license plate number, for free. This will make your catalytic converter less attractive to thieves, easier to identify as stolen property, and easier to trace back to you if it is stolen. You also might want to talk to your mechanic about having a thin piece of rebar welded over

the catalytic converter assembly. Thieves can still cut through them, but the process will take them a lot longer and will make a lot of noise, so it will discourage most thieves who want to steal quickly and quietly. 3 million customers of a major retailer hit by ANOTHER data breach

Major craft store chain Michaels just confirmed the scope of a recent attack on their payment systems. It's staggering: over 3 million customer debit and credit card numbers have been stolen from its point-of-sale system over eight months, almost triple the length of time that the store originally reported. A total of 2.6 million cards used at Michaels stores were affected. 400,000 additional cards were also hit at its subsidiary Aaron Brothers.

Hackers are outsmarting the security systems designed to detect them. They gained access to Michaels using incredibly sophisticated malware that has never been encountered before by security officials.

Who's vulnerable?

Anyone who shopped at Michaels between May 8, 2013, and January 27, 2014, are at-risk, as well as anyone who shopped at Aaron Brothers between June 2013 and February 2014. Hackers gained access to customer's credit and debit card numbers and expiration dates.

Important !! 'Heartbleed Bug' Vulnerability

A major new security <u>vulnerability</u> <u>dubbed Heartbleed</u> with severe implications for the entire Web. The bug can scrape sensitive user data, including private data such as usernames, passwords, and credit card numbers.

It's an extremely serious issue, affecting some 500,000 Web sites, according to Netcraft, an Internet research firm. Here's what you can do to make sure your information is protected, according to security experts contacted by CNET:

Some Web sites that appeared to have been affected included Yahoo and OKCupid, though the companies have said their sites are all or partly fixed. You can check sites on an individual basis here, though caution is still advised even if the site gives you an "all clear" indication. Check our constantly updating list of the top 100 Web sites and their Heartbleed patch status.)

The natural response might be to want to change passwords immediately, but security experts suggest waiting for confirmation of a fix because further activity on a vulnerable site could exacerbate the problem.


